Intern's Message: Introduction to Dietrich Bonhoeffer

This article is an introduction to who Dietrich Bonhoeffer was and brief summary of key moments in his life.

### **Who was Dietrich Bonhoeffer?**

Dietrich Bonhoeffer was a Lutheran Pastor, theologian and was also active in the German resistance to the policies of Hitler in Nazi Germany. He was born on February 4, 1906 into a family that was not very religious, but which had a strong artistic and musical tradition. His family enjoyed abundance and even privilege. His father, Karl Bonhoeffer, was a world-renown neurologist and professor of psychiatry at the University of Berlin as well as holding other important positions. Karl encouraged all his children to be disciplined and independent in their thinking. Dietrich displayed great musical talent, so it became a surprise to his family when at the age of 14, he announced he wanted to train to become a pastor...

In 1923, Dietrich began his theological studies at Tubingen University. At the age of 21, he continued his studies at Berlin University, and in 1927 received his licentiate in theology. In 1931, Dietrich returned to Berlin and was ordained as a pastor, he was 25.

Right after Hitler was elected on Jan. 31, 1933, Bonhoeffer began his opposition to the new Nazi regime through a radio broadcast he presented on February 1, this however was cut off by the Nazis. Dietrich became a founding member of The Confessing Church, which he had helped to form with Pastor Martin Niemoller. Eventually Bonhoeffer was imprisoned and executed by the Nazi regime on April 8, 1945 for his part in one of the assassination attempts on Hitler.

Bonhoeffer wrote extensively on a number of subjects and he is most known for his writings, "The Cost of Discipleship," "Life Together," and a collection of his letters from prison.
