

First Lesson: Jeremiah 26:8-15

(Jeremiah called the Israelites to repentance, warning them of the potential for disastrous consequences should the people not change their ways and live according to the will of God. the people rejected Jeremiah's prophesy and threatened his life.)

When Jeremiah had finished speaking all that the Lord had commanded him to speak to all the people, then the priests and the prophets and all the people laid hold of him, saying, "You shall die! 9Why have you prophesied in the name of the Lord, saying, 'This house shall be like Shiloh, and this city shall be desolate, without inhabitant'?" And all the people gathered around Jeremiah in the house of the Lord. 10When the officials of Judah heard these things, they came up from the king's house to the house of the Lord and took their seat in the entry of the New Gate of the house of the Lord. 11Then the priests and the prophets said to the officials and to all the people, "This man deserves the sentence of death, because he has prophesied against this city, as you have heard with your own ears." ¹²Then Jeremiah spoke to all the officials and all the people, saying, "The Lord sent me to prophesy against this house and this city all the words you have heard. ¹³Now therefore mend your ways and your deeds, and obey the voice of the Lord your God, and the Lord will relent of the disaster that he has pronounced against you. ¹⁴But as for me, behold, I am in your hands. Do with me as seems good and right to you. ¹⁵Only know for certain that if you put me to death, you will bring innocent blood upon yourselves and upon this city and its inhabitants, for in truth the Lord sent me to you to speak all these words in your ears."

Psalm 4 (read responsively)

(The psalmist cried out to God for deliverance from his enemies. So confident was he in the goodness of God, that while still in the midst of tribulation he declared that he would lie down and sleep in peace.)

Second Lesson: Philippians 3:17 - 4:1

(The saints who gathered in Philippi were reminded that the good news of God's saving action in Jesus' death and resurrection is a word that changes us and transforms our daily lives. they have been called to live as those who in all ways are to imitate Jesus Christ.)

¹⁷Brothers, join in imitating me, and keep your eyes on those who walk according to the example you have in us. ¹⁸For many, of whom I have often told you and now tell you even with tears, walk as enemies of the cross of Christ. ¹⁹Their end is destruction, their god is their belly, and they glory in their shame, with minds set on earthly things. ²⁰But our citizenship is in heaven, and from it we await a Savior, the Lord Jesus Christ, ²¹who will transform our lowly body to be like his glorious body, by the power that enables him even to subject all things to himself. ¹Therefore, my brothers, whom I love and long for, my joy and crown, stand firm thus in the Lord, my beloved.






Gospel: Luke 13:31-35



The Call Committee is excited for the congregation to meet the pastoral candidate during the **weekend of April 4 – 6, 2025**. A biography of the candidate's experience will be published in this month's newsletter and included in the bulletin. An open house will be held in Fellowship Hall on **Saturday, April 5th**, from 1pm to 3pm for the congregation to meet the candidate and his wife. Light refreshments will be provided. At 2 pm, our candidate will address those in attendance and have an opportunity to answer questions from the congregation. On Sunday, the candidate will lead worship at both services. During the Faith Builders hour, the candidate will briefly visit each classroom. The Call Committee is hoping to have a sizeable attendance at Saturday's open house and at the Sunday services to meet the proposed candidate.

Pastoral Candidate Biography

I grew up in Clear Spring, Maryland, the second of five siblings. I decided in sixth grade that I wanted to be an architect. When I graduated high school in 1981, I went to The University of Maryland to study architecture. I graduated in 1985 and worked in architectural practices in the Washington, D.C. area.

Ever since high school, I always had a feeling that God was calling me into the ministry. I had many people over the years try to encourage me. But in 2004, after talking with my wife and visiting the seminary for a weekend event, I decided to give up my career as an architect and enroll in Concordia Theological Seminary in Fort Wayne, Indiana. My four-year seminary studies were amazing. I enjoyed so much studying theology.

I graduated in May of 2008, and my first call was to Grace Lutheran Church in Warminster, Pennsylvania (a suburb of Philadelphia). Grace was a wonderful congregation, very warm and caring people. I was there for three years when I received a call back to Concordia Theological Seminary as an admission counselor.

I was so excited to be called back to my alma mater that I gladly accepted the call. It only took me a short while to realize that being an admission counselor was not what I wanted to be doing. I very much missed being in the congregation, preaching and teaching and visiting the sick and shut-in. I only stayed at the seminary for one year until I received a call to St. Paul Lutheran Church in McConnellsburg, Pennsylvania in 2013.

St. Paul Lutheran was the congregation in which my parents and grandparents grew up attending, and I was baptized at St. Paul Lutheran in 1964. I still had several family who were members of St. Paul. I was very happy at St. Paul, but unfortunately my wife was not. She did not like living in a small town and decided to divorce me in 2015.

I met Jennifer in 2017, and we married on December 29, 2018. Jennifer had a daughter and a son, and we enjoy our four grandchildren, who live in Chambersburg.

I have a 32 year old son, Kenneth, who is a geologist and lives in Fort Wayne, Indiana. My daughter is 30 years old, and lives in New York City and works as an event coordinator for the Singapore Embassy.

CARING CONVERSATION

DEVOTIONS

To distinguish Lent from "ordinary" time, call the household to meals in a new way. Have family members take turns ringing a small bell as the call to meals. Light a candle and have a few moments of silence before saying grace.
